4.6

Chairman's Report

4.6.1

Bordan reported that he and Whitelaw had met with the Benefits Committee on December 1, 1988.

It was a very amiable meeting, and they were not seen as desperate aging radicals.

The membership of the Committee professed agreement at the time. It was stressed that we were not just a lobbying group, but felt that we had a significant contribution to make.

The Committee's questions were good, some of them were rather pointed, and we had been able to answer them.

Unfortunately

only about 2/3's of the members were there. The net effect was that there are some people who cannot see the point of us being there at all. The Benefits Committee has a composition which is part of the official documents of the institution - changing them is time consuming.

Bordan met with Cohen, again on March 9. The matter is still before the Committee and should move ahead in due course.

Maurice Cohen is very anxious to meet with the representatives of our group about twice a year as he does with other groups. Also he would like to meet with the whole group - to come to a meeting. Are we prepared to invite him to our next meeting to answer questions and to have him fill us in on where this issue stands? The immediate question is should we invite Cohen to a meeting to talk about things in general, not just the pension plan? There was general agreement. Lauziere suggested that the invitation should include Dawn Johnson. The executive will decide on the timing of the invitation.

At the December meeting with the Benefits Committee, we had pointed out that the only time the University communicates with pensioners is when there is an increase in premiums for the health insurance or in the pension. The result was the Thursday Report and Concordia University Magazine are now being mailed to pensioners, as well as the Annual Report.

Bordan pointed out that for one reason or another, some people were receiving two copies of one or other of the publications, and he would ask them to tidy up their mailing list. Everyone was happy about receiving the Thursday Report.

Whitelaw asked for nominations from the floor. There were none.
